# BACKGROUND

## Brief summary of the project.

RIGE observed that Adolescent girls and women from Bindura rural were negligent when it comes to exercising their SRHR rights. Unreported cases of maternal deaths, poor healthy seeking behaviours, unreported child marriages, limited use of family planning by some women were observed prior to the implementation of the Strengthening Health Education Delivery in Communities (SHEDIC) project. The SHEDIC project, which is being supported by Gender Links seeks to enhance individual awareness of SRHR as human rights as well as increase access to SRHR resources, information and services in Bindura Rural, ward 10. The project was started in January 2023 and will end in December 2024.

# OBJECTIVES

2. Enhance individual awareness of SRHR as human rights
3. Increase access to SRHR resources, information and services in Bindura Rural, ward 10.
4. Increase health-seeking behavior among both men and women by 80%.
5. Establish a sustainable community-led SRHR program.
6. Advocate for policy changes supporting SRHR and GBV prevention.



# TARGET GROUPS

1. Girls and young women as a vulnerable group due to patriarchy require education on exercising their SRHR rights.
2. Men so that they champion access to SRHR services.
3. SRHR service providers for the improvement of service delivery.

# CHALLENGES

## Challenges

1. Some volunteer staff were not available on weekdays due to scheduling program conflicts. Most programs were done during weekends.
2. There was need for permission from local government and law enforcement agents first before conducting any activity. Permissions to hold the event were applied for in time in order to be cleared to hold events in communities.

## Lessons learnt

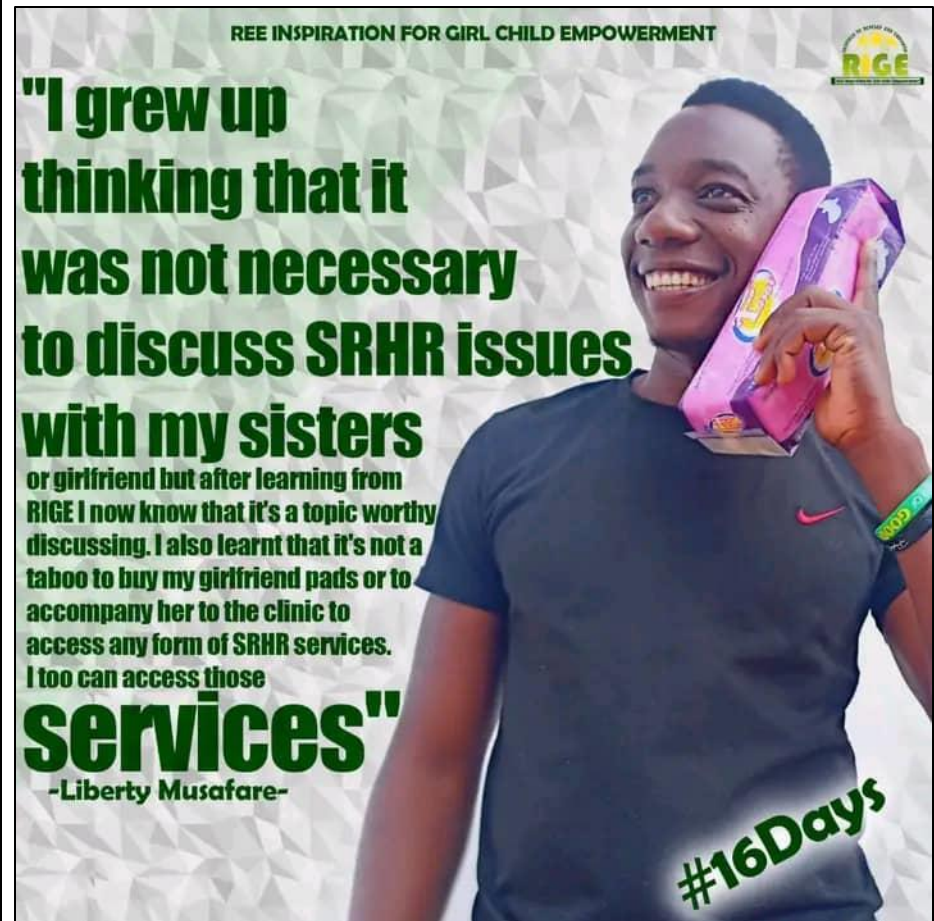
- Community engagement is crucial for sustainability.

## How lessons will be applied

- ❖ Identify men as champions for SRHR and gender equality.
- ❖ Continuous programs that empower young women and girls.

# RESULTS

- ✓ 298 women and 308 men were directly reached with SRHR information, services & resources as of 25 October 2024.
- ✓ Improved reporting of SRHR related crimes such as child marriage & maternal deaths.
- ✓ A lot of IEC materials was produced for continued awareness in the community.
- ✓ Improved social media engagement was noted.
- ✓ Improved working relationship with local government and service providers
- ✓ Improved visibility in the community.



# LEARNING
