



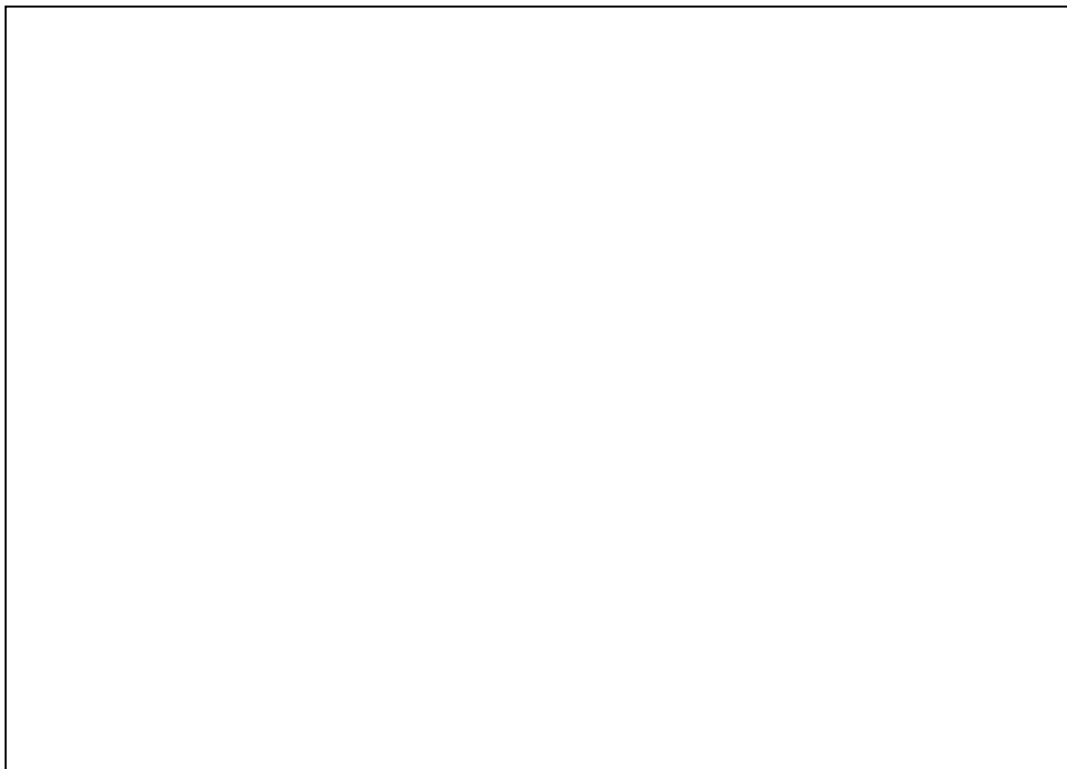

Synopsis

This report sets out building blocks for the Southern African Gender Protocol Alliance in Madagascar led by the Alliance focal network FPFE in collaboration with Gender Links, the Alliance Secretariat. The strategy sought to use this period up to February 2014 to host national meetings to canvass the country Barometer, develop fact sheets, enlist champions for the 28 targets of the SADC Gender Protocol and launch a campaign Countdown to 2015 that culminates in a high profile sustainable event until 2015. This campaign builds on a series of meetings leading up to the 2014 SADC Gender Protocol Summit. The meeting took place at Restaurant Univers, Toamasina on 01st October 2013. Attached at **Annex A** is a list of participants. Attached at Annex B is a programme. Attached at **Annex C** is the matrix of champions who have agreed to take forward the work of the SADC Gender Protocol.

Objectives

The workshop aimed to

- Validate the country Barometer
- Create awareness around the SADC Gender Protocol.
- Set up theme clusters at national, to provincial to local.
- Collect Protocol@work case studies in preparation for the 2014 SADC Protocol@Work summit.

Contexte

The Protocol on Gender and Development is a unique sub-regional instrument that is now in force, adopted at the Heads of State Summit in Johannesburg in August 2008. This instrument brings together all existing international commitments to gender equality in one instrument, and enhances these through specific targets to be achieved by 2015.

Gender coordinates the Southern African Gender Protocol Alliance that brings together national coordinating networks; regional theme clusters and interest groups to lobby for the implementation of the Protocol, Southern Africa's roadmap for achieving MDG 3 - gender equality.

Participants

24 women and 29 men attended the meeting (See Annex A). They included the following sectors:

Key activities:

- A Power point presentation of the SADC Protocol barometer and the Alliance
- Group work

➤ **GROUP 1: CONSTITUTIONAL AND LEGAL RIGHTS**

- The constitution stipulates equality of rights between men and women, but there is no application
- Equality of rights is not settled yet
- The priorities are : to popularize the laws by any means
- Empower and support women in entrepreneurship
- -Set up a monitoring and follow up committee to see discrimination on sex within all high and leading positions and employment .
- Encourage women to take responsibility in political, social and economic fields.
- Incite law-makers to devise decrees or laws that ensure gender equality and gender balance
- Make efforts on inheritance rights.

➤ **GROUP 2: GENDER AND GOVERNANCE**

- There are not enough women members of parliament
- The quota talk has been interrupted
- there has been no change in governance

- The priorities are : to pass a law on quota
- The zebra list should be integrated in the election regulations

➤ **GROUP 3 : EDUCATION AND TRAINING**

- Percentage of students in secondary school : 48% girls 52% boys
- Young people's leisure activities are not enough apart from learning
- University: 54% male , 46% female
- Vocational training: 60% male 40% female
- Children already working instead of going to school: 52% girls 48% boys
- There should be a strict policy about sending all children to school
- Scholarships for girls should be closely studied
- The mother girls should be given another chance to go back to school.

➤ **GROUP 4: PRODUCTIVE RESOURCES AND EMPLOYMENT**

- The work very often does not correspond to the training
 - the employers do not recruit any women workers
 - Many women work yet the salary is very low.
 - It is always the well-off people that can get good jobs.
- It is urgent to:
- train women
 - find out markets outside the country.

➤ **GROUP 5: Gender Based Violence**

- No clear data are available because not enough people take responsibility in spite of sensitization

- There are CECJs but the GBV victims have no shelters.
- Women undergo much violence in the field of employment, at hotels or in the streets.

➤ **GROUP 6 : HEALTH**

- Many women die when giving birth
 - Safe delivery with medical assistance is not enough
 - Maternal and infant health campaigns are organized twice a year
- What is required is: a new strategy for family planning and a permanent sensitization of women to have consultations at basic health centers.

➤ **GROUP 7: HIV/AIDS**

- Awareness arising about HIV/AIDS is enough and complete
- More women have HIV since it is due to poverty, or due to marital violence perpetrated by husbands with HIV.
- Discrimination is still a big issue: once one is known as living with HIV, one is immediately discriminated.
- The SISAL Association take in charge the persons living with HIV
- Many women are sex workers and some are still under age.

➤ **GROUP 8 : PEACE BUILDING AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION**

- Few women dare solve problems
- The quota of women gendarme is not reached
- The Civil Society should be given role to resolve conflicts
- What is urgent is to inform women about their rights to be able to resolve conflicts.

➤ **GROUP 9: IMPLEMENTATION**

- Structures to support people on what they should do, men and women alike, such as CECJ, or at the Tribunal exist.
- Consumers associations are set up to defend their rights as for utilities, food, or service provisions.
- In brief, some efforts have been made in Fianarantsoa yet much has to be done too : 15% up to now is achieved, advocacy is needed to get better results of at least by 25%.
- The priorities are to increase the number of women in the armed forces and security.
- The laws should be written in Malagasy.

➤ **GROUP 10: GENDER AND CLIMATE CHANGE**

- There are many bush fires in Tulear due to poverty.
- What is urgent is to incite people to use renewable energy such as solar energy that exists the whole year round.
- Information about the various conventions.

➤ **GROUP 11:**

- There is no legal framework ,the association of journalists is dissolved and journalists meet obstacles when solving problems
- Journalists suffer violence, insults, threats while performing their job, andeven they get imprisoned
- They are often discriminated.

Next steps :

1. - From now on, The 16 days campaign will be jointly organized with the regional alliance branch , the Local council and the Civil society, under the lead of the Ministry of Population and Social affairs.
2. The participants would like to get information about the activities or campaigns to be carried out together with the alliance, FPFE.

Participants `Questions

1-Why does the Alliance conduct such sensitization sessions within the community?

2-What is the link of this workshop with development ,yet it is the SA Region that devises it ?

3-Why is the protocol amended since you said that it had 28 targets and Climate change and the others had to be added

Answers and remarks:

- 1- To inform about the reason why Alliance and GL are set up and also the SADC protocol on gender and development.
- 2- Madagascar was among the 15 countries that signed the SADC protocol, each of them agreed to implement this agreement on gender and development. And the Alliance Madagascar is the body that follows up and monitors the application of all the provisions.
3. It is right that there are 28 articles in the SADC protocol, yet it is believed that Climate change will tremendously affect human beings and the State members are convinced that a policy is required to mitigate the impact on the population , that's the reason why it has to be added.

Next steps:

-The celebration of the 16days of activism, to promote the fight against GBV, jointly with representative of the Ministry of Population.
